We meet in a member's shop and we have



three or four lathes all going at once. Wayne has generously offered us the use of his shop for these activities. If you would like to attend, just join us at Wayne's. The address is 12012 28th Ave E, Tacoma 98445. It is just off 112th, between the Summit and Parkland areas.

One of our more experienced members is at each lathe showing people how to make good, clean, and safe cuts at the lathe. We

can usually put the tools in the hands of people

who have never turned anything before. We can also assist with learning how to sharpen tools.

Sawdust sessions are one most valuable benefit of belonging to the SPSW. We usually have some very new woodturners, some intermediate turners who might have a project with them that they are stuck on, and some very experienced members to help anyone that needs it. We all have great time!

A Word From Kent Horton

Hello, again, this is Kent Horton, your SPSW/AAW Liaison. For the past several months I have shared with you what AAW has available to you via their website (<u>woodturner.org</u>) and have been encouraging all our members to consider becoming an AAW member alongside membership in SPSW.

This month I want to focus on bringing the woodturning craft to the next generation. My own interest in turning stems directly from my 8th grade shop class where I turned a walnut candle stick as a Christmas gift for my mother in 1966. I have recently received it back as my mother had to downsize to move into an assisted living facility. I am still proud of that old candle stick.

AAW provides help and support to those members interested in working with students through **AAW Membership Scholarships for Accredited Educators**. For the past several years (except for 2021), AAW has awarded ten lathe packages consisting of a Jet Mini Lathe, set of Crown tools, set of Easy Wood Tools, Nova chuck and a face shield. All of this in an effort to get school-age youngsters actively involved and excited about woodturning. If you are interested and able, I would encourage each of you to consider contacting and volunteering to help teach woodturning skills. All too few schools still have a shop program or even an after-school club dedicated to woodworking. (Don't get me started about the ongoing demise of hands-on woodworking programs – A TRAVISTY!) Anyhow, it doesn't generally take much of a financial outlay to get a small program (Pen turning club perhaps?) up and running. Talk with Jeff Marshall, an SPSW Director-at-Large – He has been successfully mentoring woodturning at few different high schools and would love to talk with you about his experiences.

I mentioned before about AAW's Online Teaching Resource book. It is a great guide to anyone interested in teaching woodturning skills safely and includes step-by-step instructions for 18 entry level turning projects. One of my New Year's resolutions is to use lathe time at upcoming Saw Dust Sessions to complete each of these projects to have examples to share with students and teachers when I work with classes in the future (once the threat of Covid is reduced to the point I feel safe in a classroom.)

Something to think about as you make plans to attend AAW's 2022 Annual Symposium in Chattanooga, Tennessee on June 23-26.

If you would like to be notified when we are going out to cut wood so you can get a little for yourself, please let our wood-rat, Doug Reynolds, know. You don't necessarily need your own chain saw. There are many things that folks can do to help at these events. But you will see how to safely use a chain saw and also will see how to section the

tree so you get the best and most interesting wood out of it. You will also have access to people who can help you get started on how to seal the wood to minimize checking, explain the advantages of green wood turning, rough turning, and coring processes. If that sounds interesting to you, please let Doug know, and he can put you on his list and you will be contacted by e-mail when he has wood or when we're going out to cut. Zoom Meeting If you haven't been on Zoom before, just follow the steps below. (If you have been in a Zoom meeting before, just start at step 3.)b.

- 1. **The Zoom meeting invitation is only sent to active members.** So, if you have not paid your dues since October 2019, you will need to go to the members tab on the <u>SPSW website</u> (spswoodturners. org) and renew your membership. Please note that it would normally cost more for just one of these demonstrations than your SPSW dues for the entire year.
 - a. Those of you who get the newsletter by snail-mail will need to get us an e-mail address where we can send your meeting invitation. Please send it to (<u>membership@spswoodturners.org</u>)
- 2. Before the scheduled meeting, you need to go to zoom.com and download the free "Zoom Meetings" app. The Zoom download is quick, easy, and free!
- 3. Information and Invitation Delivery Schedule:
 - a. Saturday, Jan 15 The Zoom Meeting Invitation will go out to our active member's distribution list.
 - i This invitation contains a link that appears in blue letters. Just click it to join the remote demo on Thursday.
 - ii Please save this where you can find it.
 - If you don't see the invitation(s) in your inbox, then please check your "junk" or "spam" folder. If you get our newsletters, the meeting invitation should come right into your inbox.
 - b. Wednesday, Jan 19th A reminder will be e-mailed to our active member's distribution list.
 - c. Thursday, Jan 20th Log into the meeting between 6:30 and 7:00pm
 - i. Doug's demo will start at 7:00pm
 - ii. When you click on the link, you will be asked if you want to join with video and audio. Answer "yes" to both, then you will enter a virtual waiting room. Wait just a few seconds and one of the co-hosts will admit you into the actual meeting.
 - iii. **Note:** If you have previously downloaded the app, you may see an update is available. If you see it, please update your app. Zoom is making frequent changes to the program to strengthen security.
 - iv. Devices used to view the demo can be smartphones, tablet computers, laptops, etc. To fully participate, the device needs to have audio and a camera.
