As I read this article, I reflected back to the stool that Dave Best presented during the "Bring and Brag" section at our last meeting whereby he shared a finely turned oak stool he replicated from a family heirloom that was falling apart. A beautiful project! There certainly is a place for developing spindle turning skills.

Another article I found interesting was the "Then and Now" section whereby ten highly accomplished turners were asked to submit photos of wood turned objects produced early in their woodturning careers and photos of current projects. These folks also wrote about their growth as a woodturner. It was a good reminder to me that even the best of turners had had to start somewhere and their skill and design expertise was a growth process. I was able to relate with the "then" objects with my own turning and could aspire to the "now" level as some point in the future.

<u>The American Woodturner</u> magazine is one that I look forward to receiving and make a point to review closely from cover to cover once it arrives. I hope that other SPSW members find it as enjoyable to read and review each month.

Last year, each of you demonstrated at our Hobby Hall table at the Puyallup fair.


Fred asked me to set up the days, locations, and times for this year's SPSW fair demos. We will be on the same stage C this year.

2023 Membership Renewals




Despite the global pandemic our membership has stayed relatively stable and last year we ended up with about 130 paid members. But it is time to renew membership for 2023

SPSW Store August Highlight - Gluboost

Super--glue products have been successfully used to finish pens and other small projects for years. In my experience, the only problems with super-glue as a pen finish is that it can take up to 15 coats of thin super-glue to build up a thick enough layer of finish. The fumes stink, and the finish can be very brittle. But there is a new product out there, and we now have it available in the SPSW store.

In June, our own finishing expert, Michael Dredsner, gave a great presentation on a relatively new cyanoacrylate finishing system called Fill-N-Finish by GluBoost. Several people have asked if we could get some in the SPSW Store. We made an initial order, and will have it available to members at the August meeting.

If you did not see Michael's presentation, it is available on the <u>SPSW</u> website. As you saw, or will see, Michael used, the GluBoost finishing system, which comes as a kit with 2 oz. bottles of Fill-N-Finish Thin, the thicker Fill-N-Finish Pro Formula, plus a 4 oz. spray can of GluDry accelerator.

This system is amazing! It's clear, it's flexible and it's very fast to use. Just apply a small drop of GluBoost on a paper towel for any small project and wipe it onto the surface. Use a couple of coats of Pro Formula, a couple

of the layers to bubbles. surface just a

Fill-N-Finish thin, with a quick spritz of accelerator between each coat. There is no waiting for dry. That's it! You're literally done in minutes! The accelerant does not leave white spots or For a glass like high shine finish, after applying the 4 coats of Fill-N-Finish, wet sand the with micromesh abrasives down to about 12000 grit. Then polish with a Tripoli buff, or use dab of PSI's One Step plastic polish with a paper towel, and buff it right on the lathe.

We have GluBoost Fill-N-Finish kits available starting at the August Meeting. Each kit will have 2 oz. bottles of Fill-N-Finish Proformula, FNF Thin, plus a 4 oz can of GluDry spray. You will need to have the all three parts of the kit and we will sell the kit for \$43 to members through the SPSW Store.

This is a great new product! I have other finishes in my shop, but I usually go for GluBoost now anytime I am doing something like a pen or a finial. It is so much better. I can get a beautiful, clear, flexible, and long-lasting finish on my projects. Give it a try in your shop. I
