







A Word From Kent Horton

Hello, again, this is Kent Horton, your SPSW/AAW liaison. As always, my mantra: "If you are serious about becoming a better woodturner, you owe it to yourself to become a member of the AAW. They have several resources – print, video and professional IRD's to help you"

I just received this month's issue of American Woodturner – The Journal of the American Association of Woodturners. In this issue there were several articles that caught my attention the most, including: creating PVC and wood collet chucks for holding small items, turning small Etui-inspired boxes, turning threaded inserts, incorporating leather into turned objects, steam bending turned work and an article on comparing the relationship of form between pottery and turner wood objects. All-in-all one of the better issues.

Using PVC fittings to create a variety of chucks is a practical and much less expensive way to hold small objects on the lathe rather than expensive commercial specialized chucks is explained in detail.

Sam Angelo's article on turning an Etui-inspired box (Etui – ornamental case). Needle or small pill boxes are an example of these small tubular shaped boxes. The trick is getting the lid to fit just right – not too tight, not too loose.

Walt Wagner's article on turning wood threaded inserts that can then be incorporated into hollow-forms. This process seems to be a much safer way to use threading rather than attempt to create threads directly in the vessel and corresponding lid. I am thinking brass threaded inserts may be the way for me after all.

Denis Beauchesne's article on incorporating leather in bowls and vessels in several different ways along with using leather stitching to enhance the look of a turned wood object.

I never thought of combining steam bending with wood turning. While I have done steam bending wood in the past, Keith Tompkins' article opens a whole new avenue of using this centuries-old technique of woodworking.

Tim Heil's article asks a group of accomplished potters for their thoughts about design and how they directly relate to design implications for woodturners. We all want to turn bowls and hollow forms that are pleasing to the eye and have good form.

Lastly, I want to speak to the upcoming 2024 AAW International Symposium in Portland Oregon. I will be spending this next year working to promote SPSW having a strong presence at this "local" symposium. To this end, I would like to have SPSW have a distinctive polo shirt – bright color perhaps – for members who attend to wear. I am proposing a design contest for a logo to put on these shirts. The winner will receive a free shirt for their efforts (I will provide this). Design entries need to be submitted to me by April 1st, 2024, to enable us to have enough lead-time to finalize a shirt order well before the event. I welcome

your input.

Review of Dan Stromstad Demo

Last month Dan Stromstad demonstrated the One Way Coring System. He started by explaining that you don't have to even cut a bowl blank with the bansaw. Basically just cut the corners off with your chain saw.

As is normal for Dan, he explains some of the basics of turning while doing the demo such as stance and presentation of the tool. Dan began with a 19" chunk of wood that he trimmed the corners off of then he mounted it and started trimming the edges off. Even at slow speeds, the lathe was trying to do a bit of a dance. He mentioned that his lathe at home is bolted to the floor. That's a plus.

One tip he mentioned is he waxes the shaft of his tools so they glide better on the tool rest. Now there's a dandy idea.

Once Dan got the tenon turned, he turned the bowl around on the lathe so the top is facing the tailstock, then he leveled the top of the bowl.

At the 38 minute mark, Dan started mounting the coring unit. After showing how to measure and determine thickness of the bowl, he tightened the mount down then began cutting the smallest bowl. It was a bit funny because the system he was using at the demo didn't have a handle so Dan being a typical turner, made use of what was on hand, an end wrench.

Dan did mention the other coring system, the McNaughten Coring System which you can see a demo of <u>here</u> on WorththeEffort's YouTube channel. Dan mentioned that the McNaughten system has a pretty steep learning curve.

Note the bowl about to fall. Also the wrench "handle".

One thing I noticed that might be worth remembering if one get's the One Way system is that Dan regularly backed the cutter out to clear shavings in a similar manner as you would do while drilling a hole.

After completing the coring, since he had time, Dan went back and trimmed the largest bowl. He included showing a shear cut while doing so.
