Art has been integral to Roberto Ferrer from early childhood in Mexico where, ever-present art and craft infused into his life and soul. Early expression of art came through drawing and painting. Sometimes, schoolteachers would need to redirect his attention away from a sketch and back to the class assignment. His initial exposure to woodworking was in his cousin's furniture shop where he had fun just being there and on occasion, he would have an opportunity to use a saw or a plane. His initial wood projects were a simple table and bookcase. Roberto always saw a need to embellish, he recalls his early drawings often providing opportunity for embellishment. Today Roberto is a full-time wood artist based in Chicago. His website (<u>ferrerstudioart.com</u>) displays gorgeous photos of his award-winning work and includes several demonstration videos that show techniques behind his unique work. A pair of inexpensive videos cover

the use of a clever power carving jig and how to construct the jig for your shop.

Evident in his gallery of work is Roberto's passion for bold and stunning interpretations of historical cultures, figures and subjects including: the Gladiator series, Poseidon's, The Rubicon, Elquinto Sol, and Quauhtemoc among others. His well-honed craft, vast skillset and inventiveness underlie each of his creative expressions. Roberto's powerful

embellishments inhale a life force drawn from the ancient characters, flow through his body and back out, breathing that same life force into the emerging masterpiece.

I asked Roberto what message he would like to convey to our club members ahead of his remote demonstration in June. He replied, "Enjoy what you do! If you are not enjoying something, that leads to frustration. Always be willing to experiment. If the first time trying something new does not work, keep trying. It may not work the second or third time but, keep experimenting. I am always glad to provide a demonstration to show new techniques. If you learn a trick or two, I am Happy!"

Port Townsend School of Woodturning



Matt Monaco is not your ordinary woodturner. He is, in fact, an extraordinary turner and highly skilled teacher. I had the good fortune of studying with him for five days at Fort Worden School of Woodworking in April with the end goal being a lidded box. The progression to arrive at this end was well thought out: introduction/demonstration of skills and information, practice, review, added practice, new skills and exploration, practice, repetition and building on what was just practiced.

At first, I was concerned that with twelve students in class, I might not receive the attention needed to improve my turning and sharpening skills. That concern was quickly dispelled. He did an amazing job of accommodating and challenging all students who ranged from having never touched a lathe to seasoned turners. After giving group instruction, Matt checked in with each student assessing whether they needed additional direction. In addition to being able to ask for help at any time, we were invited to watch and learn as he assisted other students.

We practiced the skills necessary to make a small box such as roughing out a square block of wood with a roughing gouge and how to achieve a smooth final cut, using a spindle gouge to roll beads, the sharpening of all the tools we used, beginning skew work or rolling beads for those wanting a greater challenge (I lost track of the number of catches I made), making tenons for both ends of the box, hollowing the box, and making the lid fit with a "pop." The thing that most intrigued me was the time we spent on shaping "solid forms" before turning the actual box.

Matt not only taught us skills but interjected his wisdom of life as well. One of his first statements was "Practice makes progress, not perfect. Nothing is perfect." Other comments were "Minor changes make a big difference (referring to tool presentation and control); All questions are good questions." He also contends that there needs to be a contrast for understanding, so in his teaching he shared how not to do something as well as how you should do it and why. Another expression he used was "Slow is fast, and fast is slow." (A slow tool will give a cleaner cut and will save you time when sanding.)



If this sounds like a pitch for taking a class with Matt, it is. You will not regret it. He will be back in 2025 teaching a bowl turning class.

A Diamond in the Chips

Our featured demonstrator for May 2024 will be long time club member Doug Reynolds. Doug last presented for our club in January of 2022. His topic that night explored stabilizing wood. This was one of the early demonstrations I attended after joining the club. His presentation thoroughly covered the why and how of wood stabilization as well as the integration of the dying processes. Wood stabilization can be accomplished through several techniques. Some of those techniques are a bit complicated. Doug's efforts that night removed much of the mystery for those attending this interesting presentation. Since then, I have gotten to know Doug a bit more. During one of the club's endof-year celebration dinners, Sue and I enjoyed the pleasure of sitting with Doug and Carrol. Doug and I soon found we share a passion for Arts and Crafts Furniture and both of us have taken classes from Darrell Peart—an internationally recognized expert on Greene & Greene furniture and longtime Seattle area professional furniture maker.

After being around Doug I've come to learn, it does not take too long to literally feel a little of the Army leaking out occasionally. For those who have almost suffered a heart attack standing next to Doug as he deploys his 120dB, high pitch whistle to bring the crowd to attention, you know what I mean. Similarly, for those of us that enjoy supporting the efforts to gather and prepare wood for the club, we often receive a WARNING ORDER from our dearest Wood Rats Leader, letting the troops know that a wood collection date should be expected soon, and further instructions will be provided as soon as the Pentagon sends the final invasion orders.

All kidding aside, Doug has a huge heart, and he cares deeply about our club and the local community. Last year, Doug leveraged his leadership skills to support food insecurity in the community. For much of 2023 Doug engaged and led our club in supporting the Empty Bowls Fundraiser for the Emergency Food Network, a Pierce County nonprofit with the stated mission of providing Pierce County with a consistent, diverse, and nutritious food supply so that no person goes hungry. Through Doug's and a substantial number of club members' efforts, the South Puget Sound Woodturners provided more than 200 bowls for the Emergency Food Network's 2023 fundraising auction event. Our club's contributions as well as other artist groups combined to raise more than \$16,000 for this vital mission. I would also add how much I appreciate Doug's considerate support throughout the transition of SPSW Program Director role from his deft leadership to my hands. His thoughtful efforts facilitated a smooth and informative transition that ensured a fantastic 2024 Program for our club without a hitch. Thank your Doug!

That vital woodturning accessory that interfaces between the machine and the workpiece without requiring fasteners. The class was on Miniature Hollow Forms and Surface Treatment. Laurent subsequently moved to Colorado and became Trent Bosch's son-in-law.

I have attended classes at Marc Adams for over fifteen years and am never disappointed. Laurent was trained at a French turning school that is 700 hours long plus two, week-long final exams. Each week is a different subject. He not only knows his stuff but was a very capable teacher. The picture is Laurent holding a toy top box. Yes, the lid comes off and it still works as a top.

We worked on a mini vase of our own design, Christmas ornaments, finials, texturing and surface treatments, a pumpkin box which was my entry in the President's Challenge culminating in the tea pot

with drop – a miniature tea pot pouring a huge drop of tea. The tea pot is suspended in air supported by the drop. Then we were left on our own to work on what interested us most. I made eight miniature hollow forms, textured some and colored others with ink and milk paint (the pumpkin). Laurent and Will, the shop assistant, were always readily available for additional guidance.

A great time was had by all in attendance.

His President's Challenge piece was pulled off the extra turned piece table because he didn't know the details of May's challenge. With that beautiful crotch with three sides, Steve decided to go out into nature to get some inspiration in his desire to try his hand at carving following Elizabeth Weber's April Demonstration. He took several images of azalea leaves he liked, used a photo editor and printer to resize the images to fit on each side of the bowl, and then traced the leaves onto the bowl for a cutting guide. If you looked closely, there were three different types of impressions that were carved from three different leaf patterns.

Like many of you in the SPSW, Steve turned his first bowl in Jr High School and did so through high school. However, like many, he put away the tools and went to work. It was over 20 years later, when he started to dabble a bit with a Jet mini lathe. After retiring from The Boeing Co, he and his wife Kathy were invited by Georgean Curran to attend a South Puget Sound Woodturner's club meeting. He has been a member since 2017 and has brought many beautiful turned bowls. Steve has since upgraded his Jet Mini lathe to Nova 2000 and then to a Robust American Beauty that can turn just about anything. I look forward to seeing more beautiful pieces by Steve in the future as his artistry blossoms even more.

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

Zoom Meeting If you haven't been on Zoom before, just follow the steps below. (If you have been in a Zoom meeting before, just start at step 3.)b.

- 2. Before the scheduled meeting, you need to go to zoom.com and download the free "Zoom Meetings" app. The Zoom download is quick, easy, and free!

 - If you don't see the invitation(s) in your inbox, then please check your "junk" or "spam" folder. If you get our newsletters, the meeting invitation should come right into your inbox.

 - c. The day of the meeting Log into the meeting by 7:00pm
 - i. The demo will start at 7:00pm
 - ii. When you click on the link, you will be asked if you want to join with video and audio. Answer "yes" to both, then you will enter a virtual waiting room. Wait just a few seconds and one of the co-hosts will admit you into the actual meeting.
