#### **SPSW Website**

Have you visited the SPSW website? I'm sure you've heard about all of the scams and web attacks that occur on a daily basis. The SPSW website is not immune to these attacks. But we have a tool installed called WP Cerber Security. The WP stands for WordPress, which is the software that our site is developed with. WP Cerber acts like our security fence to prevent damaging attacks on the site. Back in late 2020/early 2021 we were seeing an

average of 2000 malicious attempts per week stopped by WP Cerber. Last month, July 2024 we saw 14,000 per week! And have you noticed our URL in the address bar? It starts with https:// but do you know what the "s" represents? It indicates that the website has a "secure socket layer" (SSL) certificate.



An SSL certificate is a digital certificate installed on our web server, which enables a secure, encrypted connection between our server and your web browser. This certificate verifies our website's identity and allows it to implement SSL encryption-based security. SSL is commonly used in online services that require secure information transmission, such as:

- Online banking and shopping
- Email services
- Social media platforms
- Government websites

So visit your club's website and be assured that we are doing everything we can to make you visit safe and secure.



#### A Word From Kent Horton

Hello . . . again, this is kent Horton with another installment of SPSW's AAW Connection. As I have, with every installment of my newsletter articles – I strongly encourage fellow SPSW members to join AAW if you are not already a member, The AAW provides great resources for all woodturners to improve their craft – regardless of your current skill level from rank beginner to accomplished professional.

In a recent issue of "American Woodturner" (the monthly magazine published by AAW) there were two "how to" articles that caught my eye. The first was dealing with turning a kitchen scoop (think small coffee measuring scoop). The process Bill Kram describes begins with mounting the scoop blank on a large disk using hot melt glue and hollowing out the bowl portion first and then remounting the blank in a spindle orientation and turning the outside of the bowl and handle. Other methods I have read about require making a special jig for each scoop and have the handle act like a propeller while turning the bowl portion. I shutter thinking of how it would feel when my finger gets too close to that propeller. Mr. Kram's method sounds so much safer, I think this project will need to go onto my "someday I would like to try that" list. I am thinking this would make a great stocking stuffer for the coffee drinkers in my family.

The second project I think would be interesting would be to make an accent light with an open segmented base that incorporates a glass orb. The light source is an LED puck light that illuminates not only the spaces in the segmented base, but also as the light radiates through the glass orb. A very distinctive lamp.

- The 5th Oregon Woodturning Symposium will be on March 14-16, 2025, in Albany, OR
- Lastly, the 2025 International Symposium will be on June 12-15, 2025 in Saint Paul, MN, the home of the AAW and the Gallery of Wood Art.

This President's Challenge was no exception to the rule when it came to beauty and elegance, that's for sure. Our winner is none other than Chris Christensen. You might recognize his lattice bowl from last month's show and tell. We were all blown away with that one. I even overheard someone say that the quality of style, workmanship and artistry could be AAW American Woodturner Magazine worthy.
